Max enjoyed a little nip now and then. Alcoholic drinking on the premises was strictly forbidden.


You guessed it. When Max retired, it was discovered that the Schiffs reagent was good old Scotch whiskey. Max never appeared "under the influence" during his many working years.

Potential Fellow Rule Changes

The Board of Directors established a Committee to Re-examine the Fellow's Selection Process at the November 2007 Board meeting. This Committee was chaired by Fellow and Board member Cheryl Teich; with Fellows and Board members Neil Yeoman and Ignacio Grossman; Fellow and Admissions Committee Chair David Eckhardt; Fellows' "Big Wheel" John O'Connell, and AIChE staff representation. The 2007 AIChE President Larry Evans commissioned the Committee to examine how to improve the impact, as well as the support, of the Fellows program on the AIChE mission and vision. The Committee to Re-examine the Fellow Selection Process made several recommendations which were approved at the Board of Directors Meeting on November 14, 2008. The recommendations involved two areas:

- Fellows selection process (to modify the time of 25 years in practice to 15 years with more flexible, but not looser, selection criteria, and to improve and make more transparent the selection and notification procedures)
- Build a Fellows Community to increase the visibility of the Fellows in AIChE, and recognize and more effectively utilize the wisdom and experience of the Fellows

Why consider changes? The membership grade of Fellow, the highest in the Institute, was established in 1969 to provide special recognition of AIChE members having significant achievements and making exceptional contributions to the profession. Fellow grade is to honor the many members who visibly supported our profession and discipline but were too numerous to receive Institute awards. Requirements for Fellow had included 25 years of practice in the profession, significant professional attainment, and engineering accomplishment. The requirements for Fellow are specified in our By-Laws.

Status and Next Steps: The recommendations of the Committee require further development prior to changing Admissions guidelines or the By-Laws or to establish the Fellows community. In particular, no decisions or actions have been taken that change the current Fellow selection criteria.

Two task teams have been formed to carry out the work going forward. A Fellow Admissions Task Team, chaired by Dave Eckhardt, who serves as chair of the Institute Admissions Committee, will focus on the Fellow selection process. A Fellows Community Task Team, chaired by John O'Connell, Fellows' "Big Wheel", is focused on enhancing the Fellows community. Cheryl Teich has agreed to continue service as the Board lead in coordinating this work. Neil Yeoman, Board member, will also serve as part of the coordination team. Cheryl will report back to the Board of Directors at the April 28, 2009 Board meeting on the status of this work.

The Board endorsed the development of guidelines for the Fellows selection process. Any change in the guidelines used by the Admissions Committee will be approved by the Board. Concerns have been expressed with regard to the selection process recommendations. Thus it is important that these concerns be considered as part of the continuing work.

The Board supports recommendations for enhancing the Fellows community. It is important that this task be carried out with care to avoid duplicating activities or competing with other entities.



Experience shows that it is important to be transparent and to communicate effectively with the membership, especially with the Fellows. Members are invited to submit comments to the following address <u>fellows@aiche.org</u> or contribute comments using the AIChE Fellows Forum.
